#### Main purpose for the OCOF:

 To provide a regular forum for the 12 participating PIC NMSs to discuss the current ENSO status, recent one and three-month rainfall, drought (if present), their seasonal climate outlooks and stakeholders engagement with other countries and the COMP (Bureau of Meteorology and SPREP) project team.

In addition, it serves as an online training forum for recent SCOPIC\* development and gives the project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project related matters.

#### Observations and Verification of June to August 2019 outlooks:

Observed rainfall for the one and three-month periods ending August 2019 were discussed for each PIC. This month, several countries experienced extreme rainfall as shown in the following table:

Validation of forecasts with observed rainfall for the months of June to August 2019 period showed 19 consistent, 28 near-consistent and 12 inconsistent outlooks (59 stations across 10 countries).

A summary of results (C-Consistent, NC-Near Consistent, In-Inconsistent, N/A-not available) for each country is as follows:

Cook Islands (1C, 1NC); Fiji (2C, 9NC, 2In); Kiribati (3C, 1NC); RMI (1C, 1NC); Niue (1NC); Palau (1NC); PNG (2C, 4NC, 2In); Samoa (1NC, 3In); Solomon Islands (2C, 2NC; 3In); Tonga (1C, 3NC, 2In); Tuvalu (2C, 2NC) and Vanuatu (5C, 2In).

Overall: 19C, 28NC, 12ln.

#### October to December 2019 Outlooks:

SCOPIC outlooks: 56% of the 61 stations have their highest probability in tercile 1, no station in tercile 2, 10% in tercile 3, 21% have near-equal probabilities in two terciles and 13% have near-equal probabilities in three terciles.

POAMA outlooks: 47% of the 49 stations have their highest probability in tercile 1, 2% in tercile 2, 47% in tercile 3, 2% in near-equal probabilities in two terciles and 2% in near-equal probabilities in three terciles.
