 To provide a regular forum for the 12 participating PIC NMSs to discuss the current ENSO status, recent one and three-month rainfall, drought (if present), their seasonal climate outlooks and stakeholders engagement with other countries and the COMP (Bureau of Meteorology and SPREP) project team.

In addition, it serves as an online training forum for recent SCOPIC development and gives the project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project related matters.

Observations and Verification of February to April 2020 outlooks:

Observed rainfall for the one and three-month periods ending April 2020 were discussed for each PIC. This month, several countries experienced extreme rainfall as shown in the following table:

June to August 2020 Outlooks:

SCOPIC outlooks: 44% of the 61 stations have their highest probability in tercile 1, 2% in tercile 2, 15% in tercile 3, 13% have near-equal probabilities in two terciles and 26% have near-equal probabilities in three terciles.
