Main purpose for the OCOF:

 To provide a regular forum for the 12 participating PIC NMSs to discuss the current ENSO status, recent one and three-month rainfall, drought (if present), their seasonal climate outlooks and stakeholders engagement with other countries and the COMP (Bureau of Meteorology and SPREP) project team.

In addition, it serves as an online training forum for recent SCOPIC development and gives the project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project related matters.

Observations and Verification of January to March 2021 outlooks:

Observed rainfall for the one and three-month periods ending March 2021 were discussed for each PIC. This month, several countries experienced extreme rainfall as shown in the following table:

Validation of forecasts with observed rainfall for the months of January to March 2021 period showed 35 consistent, 18 near-consistent and 2 inconsistent outlooks (55 stations across 11 countries).

A summary of results (C-Consistent, NC-Near Consistent, In-Inconsistent, N/A-not available) for each country is as follows:

Cook Islands (1C, 1NC); **Fiji** (8C,2NC); **Kiribati** (4C); **RMI** (); **Niue** (1NC); **Palau** (1NC); **PNG** (5C, 4NC); **Samoa** (2C, 2NC); **Solomon Islands** (3C, 3NC, 1In); **Tonga** (5C, 1NC);

Tuvalu (4C) and Vanuatu (3C, 3NC, 1ln).

Overall: 35C, 18NC, 2In.

May to July 2021 Outlooks:

SCOPIC outlooks: 14% of the 59 stations have their highest probability in tercile 1, 15% in tercile 2, 55% in tercile 3, 3% have near-equal probabilities in two terciles and 15% have near-equal probabilities in three terciles.
