 project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project related matters.

Validation of forecasts with observed rainfall for the months of March to May 2021 period showed 28 consistent, 25 near-consistent and 5 inconsistent outlooks (58 stations across 12 countries).

A summary of results (C-Consistent, NC-Near Consistent, In-Inconsistent, N/A-not available) for each country is as follows:

Cook Islands (2C); Fiji (5C, 5NC, 2ln); Kiribati (2C, 2NC); RMI (1C. 1NC); Niue (1NC); Palau (1C); PNG (2C, 6NC); Samoa (2C, 2NC); Solomon Islands (3C, 3NC); Tonga (4C, 1NC, 1ln); Tuvalu (4C) and Vanuatu (2C, 4NC, 1ln).

Overall: 28C, 25NC, 5ln.

July to Sepetmber 2021 Outlooks:

SCOPIC outlooks: 14% of the 63 stations have their highest probability in tercile 1, 5% in tercile 2, 17% in tercile 3, 25% have near-equal probabilities in two terciles and 38% have near-equal probabilities in three terciles.
