

October to December 2021 Outlooks:

ACCESS-S outlooks:

There is a strong dry signal extending east-southeast from eastern FSM to northern French Polynesia. In contrast there is a strong wet signal south of the dry signal covering from Palau to southern French Polynesia. The strength of the wet signal is higher in the west.

Blank (white) cells indicate the chance is <40% in all categories – so it could be "little guidance" (e.g. 30/36/34), or near-equal in two categories (e.g. 39/37/24).



Ocean Conditions

Observations of June to August 2021

Sea surface temperature:

3 monthly sst shows near normal conditions in the central equatorial regions with parts of Kiribati having slightly cooler then normal conditions. Boomerang shape of warmer than normal conditions persisted in the west and remainder of the partner countries.




Sea level remained higher than normal for most of the countries from June to August. South of PNG and Northern Line Islands of Kiribati experienced lower than normal conditions.


October to December 2021 Outlooks:

Sea surface temperature outlook: Equatorial zones east of Nauru is forecasted to have cooler than normal conditions with temperture difference of 0.4 to 2°C. A boomerang shape of warm conditions is predicted in the western and remainder of the partner countries.

Sea level outlook: sea level is forecasted to be higher than normal for most of the countries, ranging from 30 to 300 mm in the western Pacific.

Coral Bleaching Outlook: 4 weeks coral bleaching outlook indicates 'no stress' level for much of the partner countries except for the north western Pacific which is likely to have bleaching watch to alert level 1.
