- In addition, it serves as an online training forum for recent SCOPIC development and gives the project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project related matters.



January to March 2022 Outlooks:

ACCESS-S outlooks:

There is a strong dry signal extending northeast PNG to central French Polynesia, with a second band just north of the equator extending to eastern Kiribati. In contrast there is a strong wet signal covering from Palau to the northern Marshall Islands and a second band from southeast PNG to southern French Polynesia. The pattern is reasonably consistent with a possible La Niña.

Blank (white) cells indicate the chance is <40% in all categories – so it could be "little guidance" (e.g. 30/36/34), or near-equal in two categories (e.g. 39/37/24).



Ocean Conditions

Observations of September to November

Sea surface temperature:

3 monthly SST shows cooler conditions prevailed along the central equatorial regions including parts of Kiribati, Nauru, Tuvalu and Cook Islands. Boomerang shape of warmer than normal conditions persisted in the west and remainder of the partner countries.



Sea level remained higher than normal for most of the countries from September to November, with highest anomalies north and south of the equator around 10° latitudes


January to March 2022 Outlooks:

Sea surface temperature outlook: Equatorial zones east of Kiribati (Gilber Islands) is forecasted to have cooler than normal conditions with temperature in the range of -0.4 to -3 °C. Nauru, Tuvalu, parts of Samoa and the Cook Islands are favoured to be neutral. A boomerang shape of warm conditions is predicted in the western and remainder of the partner countries.

Sea level outlook: sea level is forecasted to be higher than normal for countries near or in the Western Warm Pool (Palau, FSM, southern RMI, north Tuvalu, PNG, Solomon Islands, northern Fiji), ranging from 30 to 200 mm in the western Pacific. Pools of lower sea levels is predicted in southern Fiji and Vanuatu, northern Cook Islands and Kiribati (Line Islands). Note that this outlook does not include trends of sea level rise.




