

October to December 2022 Outlooks:

ACCESS-S outlooks:

The ACCESS-S for October to December shows a large region where below normal rainfall is very likely stretching from FSM and northern PNG in the west, to northern French Polynesia and Pitcairn Island in the east. To the southwest of this region, the ACCESS model shows the opposite signal, that is, moderate to high chances for above average rainfall in a band stretching southeast from Palau across most of PNG, the main islands of the Solomon Islands, New Caledonia, Vanuatu, Fiji, Tonga, Niue, the southern half of the Cook Islands, and southern French Polynesia. Above normal is also favoured for central RMI.

Blank (white) cells indicate the chance is <40% in all categories – so it could be "little guidance" (e.g. 30/36/34), or near-equal in two categories (e.g. 39/37/24).



Ocean Conditions

Observations of June to August 2022

Sea surface temperature:

Three monthly SST shows cooler conditions along the central equatorial regions including Nauru, southern Marshall Islands, northern Tuvalu, Kiribati and northern Cook Islands. Near normal conditions observed along 10 degrees North latitude and over northern Marshall Islands, FSM, southern Tuvalu, northern Samoa and central Cook Islands. Warmer than normal conditions persisted in the remainder partner countries stretching from Palau to southern Cook Islands, with significant SST anomalies above 1.5°C located southward from PNG to southern Tonga.




Sea level remained higher than normal for most of the countries from June to August, with significant sea level anomalies above 200mm located from the Solomon Sea to eastern Fiji, with patches over southern Tonga, Niue and southern Cook Islands

October to December 2022 Outlooks:


Sea surface temperature outlook: Equatorial zones east of Nauru is forecasted to have cooler than normal conditions with temperature range of -0.4 to -1.2 °C. Marshall Islands, central and southern Tuvalu, central Cook Islands are favoured to be neutral. Warm conditions are predicted in the western and remainder of the partner countries. Significant temperatures of 1.2 to 3.0 °C stretch southeastward from PNG to southern Cook Islands.


Sea level outlook: Sea level is forecasted to be higher than normal for countries near or in the Western Warm Pool (Palau, FSM, southwestern RMI, PNG, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, southern Fiji, and southern Tonga), ranging from 30 to 200 mm in the western Pacific, with significant sea level anomalies of 100-200mm in the Bismarck Sea, Solomon Sea, Solomon Islands and southern parts of Palau, FSM, Fiji and Tonga. Pools of below average sea levels is predicted in northeastern RMI, central and northern Cook Islands and Kiribati (central and southern Line Islands). Note that this outlook does not include trends of sea level rise.

Coral Bleaching Outlook: 4 weeks coral bleaching outlook indicates 'Alert 2' predicted for parts of PNG, 'Alert 1' for Palau and western FSM, with 'Warning' for central FSM, northern RMI. 'Watch' status for remainder of FSM, RMI, PNG and northern Solomon Islands. The remaining countries are predicted to experience no thermal stress.
