Main purpose for the OCOF:

- To provide a regular forum for the 14 participating PIC NMSs to discuss the current ENSO status, recent one and three-month rainfall, drought (if present), their seasonal climate outlooks and stakeholders' engagement with other countries and the SPP (Bureau of Meteorology and SPREP) project team.
- In addition, it serves as an online training forum for recent ACCESS development and gives the project team and the NMSs an opportunity to discuss other project-related matters.

Observations of February to April 2025:

Observed rainfall for the one and three-month periods ending April 2025 were discussed for each PIC. This month, several countries experienced extreme rainfall as shown in the following table:

June to August 2025 Outlooks:


ACCESS-S outlooks:

The three-month ACCESS-S rainfall outlook for **June-August 2025** shows strong probabilities for below normal rainfall likely or very likely from Guam, southern CNMI, northern FSM to northern RMI, and northern tip of Line Islands (Kiribati) in the northern Hemisphere. There is also below normal probabilities over central Line Islands (Kiribati), northern French Polynesia, and patches over Pitcairn Islands.

Above normal rainfall is likely or very likely in Palau, northern CNMI, and southern RMI in the northern Hemisphere. There is also strong probabilities for above normal for PNG, Solomon Is., most of New Caledonia, northern Vanuatu, Fiji, Tonga, Wallis and Futuna, Niue, American Samoa, southern Cook Islands, and western French Polynesia. Patches of above normal rainfall likely or very likely over Kiribati (southern Phoenix, and central Line Is.), Tuvalu, and Pitcairn Is.



Ocean Conditions

Observations of February to April 2025:

Sea surface temperature:

Three-monthly SST anomalies showed above-normal over most of the COSPPac countries, except for near-normal to below normal SST anomalies over Nauru and Kiribati (Gilbert Islands, Phoenix Islands and central and northern Line Islands. Above SST anomalies up to 1.5°C were observed in PNG and part of Palau, with a few patches over western Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, New Caledonia, RMI, FSM, and Fiji. The SST anomalies for the remaining countries were utmost 1.0°C above normal.



Sea Levels:

April Sea levels:


In April, sea levels were generally above normal across most COSPPac countries. However, near-normal to below-normal sea levels were recorded in parts of Kiribati, particularly the Phoenix Islands and much of the Line Islands. Patches of near-normal sea levels were also observed over the Solomon Islands, Tonga, Niue, and the Cook Islands.







Positive sea level anomalies exceeding +200 mm were observed in Palau, the Marshall Islands (RMI), the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), Papua New Guinea (PNG), the Solomon Islands, Tuvalu, Tonga, and New Caledonia. Moderate positive anomalies between +50 mm and +200 mm were observed across much of Vanuatu, Samoa, Nauru, Kiribati (Gilbert Islands and the southern edge of the Line Islands), Fiji, Tonga, the Cook Islands, and New Caledonia. Meanwhile, near-normal anomalies (-50 mm to 50 mm) persisted across most of the Kiribati Islands, particularly in the Phoenix and Line Islands.



June to August Outlooks:

Sea surface temperature (SST) outlook:

SSTs are forecast to be above normal across most of the Pacific Islands, except for patches of near normal to be observed over Kiribati Islands, Cooks Islands and French Polynesia. Above normal as high as 1.2°C are predicted for Palau, FSM, PNG, Solomon Islands, Vanuatu, Fiji, Tonga, New Caledonia. Additionally, above normal SSTs but as high as 0.8°C are predicted for the rest of the countries.

Sea level outlook:

Sea levels are forecast to be as high as 200mm over Palau, but 100mm over FSM, southern New Caledonia, southern Fiji and southern Tonga. In contrast, sea levels are predicted to be below normal as low as 100mm over eastern Solomon Islands, Tuvalu, Tokelau, southern part of Phoenix Islands, Niue and Cook Islands and 60mm over southern Line Islands. The remaining parts of countries and countries not mentioned yet are forecast to be near-normal.

Note that this outlook does not include trends of sea level rise.









Coral Bleaching Outlook:

For the four week outlook to 9 June, "Alert Levels 2 and 1" over part of PNG and "Alert Level 1" over southern half of Palau. "Warning" for the remainder of PNG and Palau, as well as areas of southern FSM. 'Watch' or ' No Stress' over other countries.


