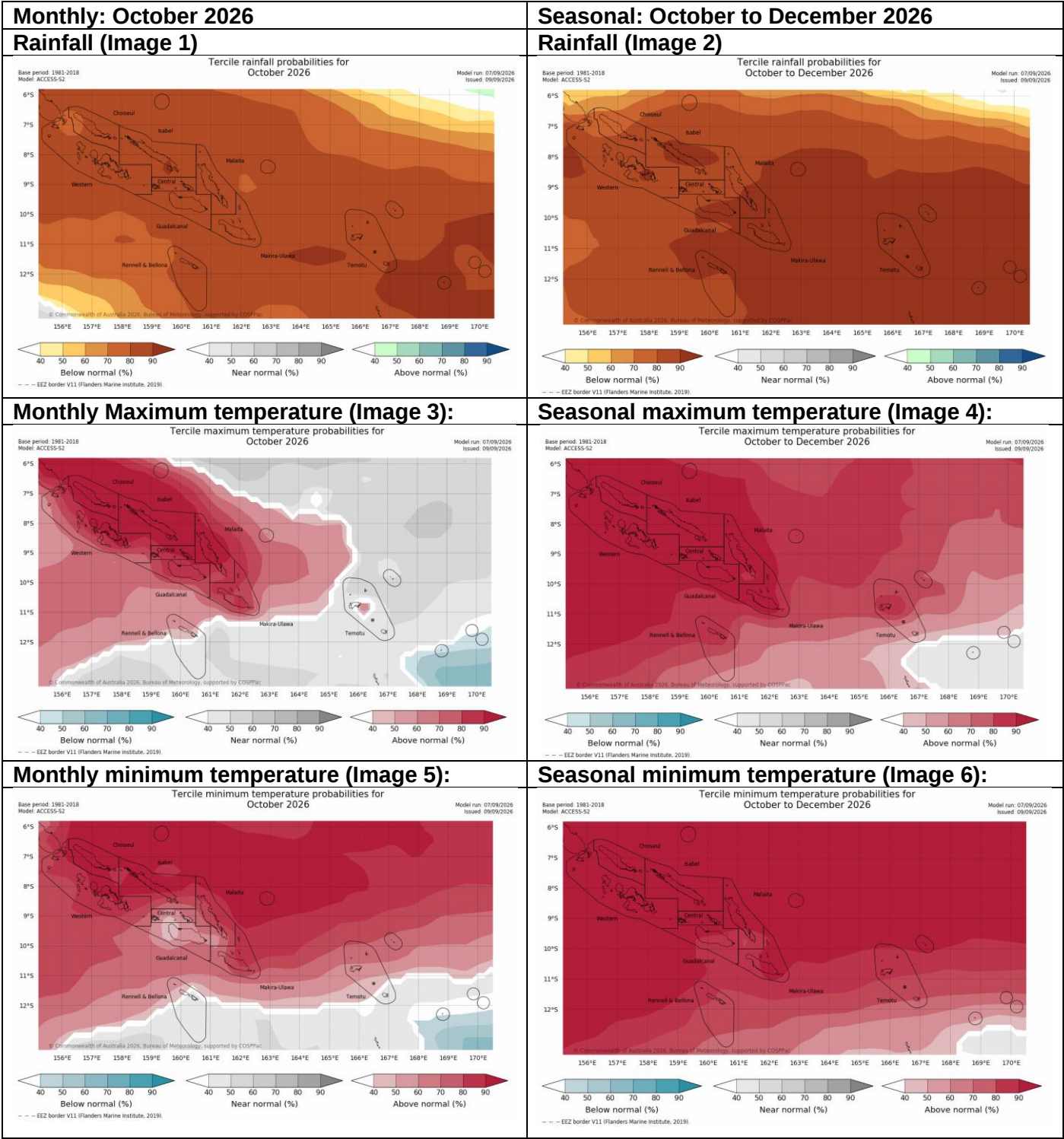

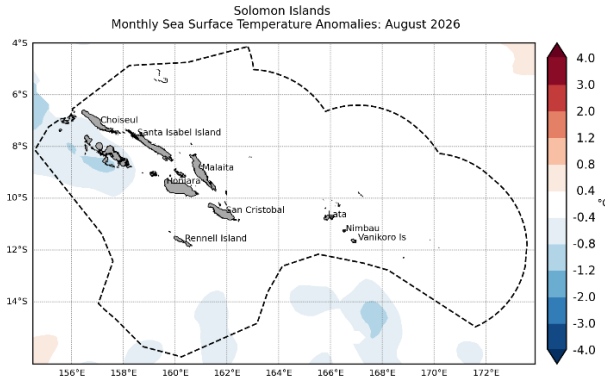

Summary Statement

Monthly and last three months: August/June to August 2026 statement

The rainfall for August was near-normal to above-normal across the country. Over the past three months, Taro and Munda were below-normal, and near-normal to above-normal across the country. Auki and Kirakira both posted their highest August rainfall records, followed by Honiara's fourth-highest August record.

Part 1i. Monthly and Seasonal Outlooks for October and October to December 2026

Monthly/Seasonal rainfall and temperature Outlook statements

The rainfall for October 2026, and the average for October to December 2026, are very likely to be below-normal across the country.

Maximum and minimum temperatures during October 2026 are very likely to be near-normal and above-normal over the Solomon Islands.

Maximum and minimum temperatures averaged over October to December 2026 are very likely to be above-normal for the country.

Part 2: Recent Ocean summary statement

Monthly and last three months: August/June to August 2026

August sea surface temperatures (SSTs) around the Solomon Islands were -0.4 to 0.4°C near-normal and 0.4 to 0.4°C near-normal to 0.4 to 0.8°C above-normal SSTs over June to August 2026.

August sea levels around the Solomon Islands were 100 to 200 mm below-normal, -30 to 30mm near-normal, and 100 to 200 mm above-normal.

A coral bleaching no-stress status is currently in effect for the country as of 08th September 2026.

Part 2i. Monthly and Seasonal Outlooks for October and October to December 2026

Ocean Variable statement

October and averaged over October to December 2026 sea surface temperatures (SSTs) around the Solomon Islands are predicted to be -0.4 to 0.4°C near-normal and 0.4 to 0.8°C above-normal.

October and averaged over October to December 2026 sea levels around the Solomon Islands are predicted to be 200 to 300 mm below-normal, -30 to 30 mm near-normal, and 30 to 60 mm above-normal.

Coral Bleaching outlook indicates no-stress status for the next 4 weeks.

In brief, for the teleconference:

- Rainfall was near-normal to above-normal for August and below-normal to above-normal for June to August 2026, except Henderson and Honiara, where rainfall was above normal for both periods.
- The rainfall outlook generally indicates below-normal most likely in October 2026 and for total rainfall over October to December 2026.
- SSTs were near-normal to above-normal for August and June to August 2026. The outlook shows near-normal to above-normal SSTs for the next one and three months.
- Sea levels were below-normal to above-normal for August. Below-normal to above-normal sea levels are predicted for October and October to December 2026.
