




PKO4 (MHEWS) of the PIMS: Regional Activities

- a. Assess current status, needs and gaps and establish and/or strengthen MHEWS and ensure that it is integrated into government policies, decision-making processes and emergency management systems
- b. Develop a formal agreement between relevant non-government stakeholders and national disaster management authority in supporting disaster preparedness and response.
- c. Support NHMS to work with NDMOs, sectors and humanitarian organisations to identify danger levels for selected hazards and reliable forecast triggers e.g. Forecast-based Action or Forecast-based Financing
- d. Formalise service agreement between NDMO, NMSs and Telecommunication to ensure that free communications such as SMS are enabled.
- e. Use of traditional, indigenous and local knowledge and practices to complement scientific knowledge in disaster risk reduction activities.



Liaison Platform

- to maximise the benefits to the Pacific meteorology and disaster management sectors through leveraging new and existing initiatives and funds.

- Pacific Partnership Coordination Mechanism (Donor Meetings)












- a. Recommended that SPREP and SPC facilitate the establishment of a structured mechanism to foster collaboration and interaction between providers and users of early warning information, which will contribute to building a resilient Pacific including through the Weather Ready Pacific;
- Recommended that SPREP and SPC work together to support the mechanism alongside key partners WMO, UNDRR, Pacific Disability Forum (PFD) and others <regional actors>; and
- c. Recommended that joint meetings of the NMHS, NDMO and other relevant stakeholders, be held when the opportunities arise.

 Opportunity that brought all the MHEWS stakeholders under the EW4All and the Weather Ready Pacific




Pacific Regional Policy Landscape
